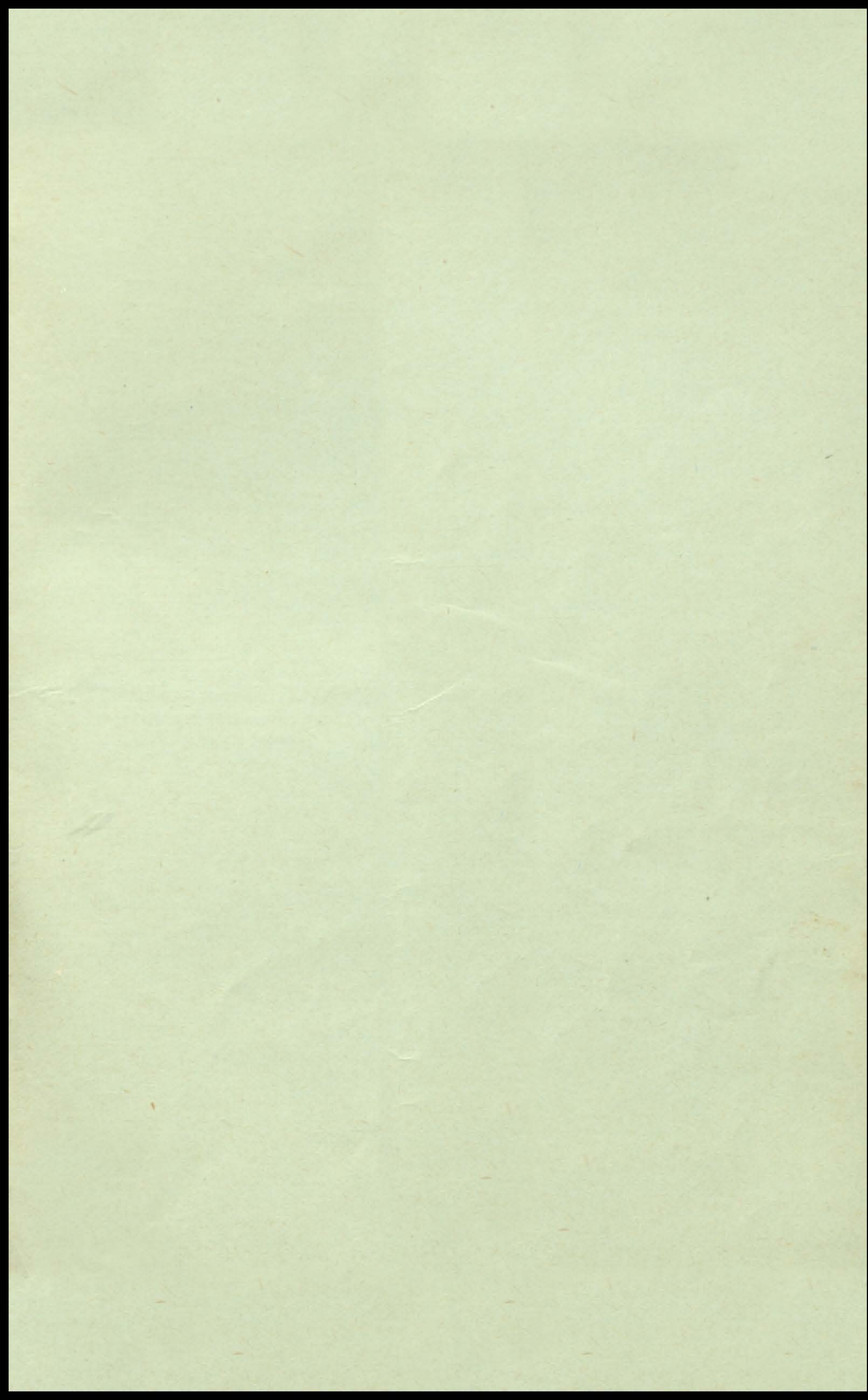

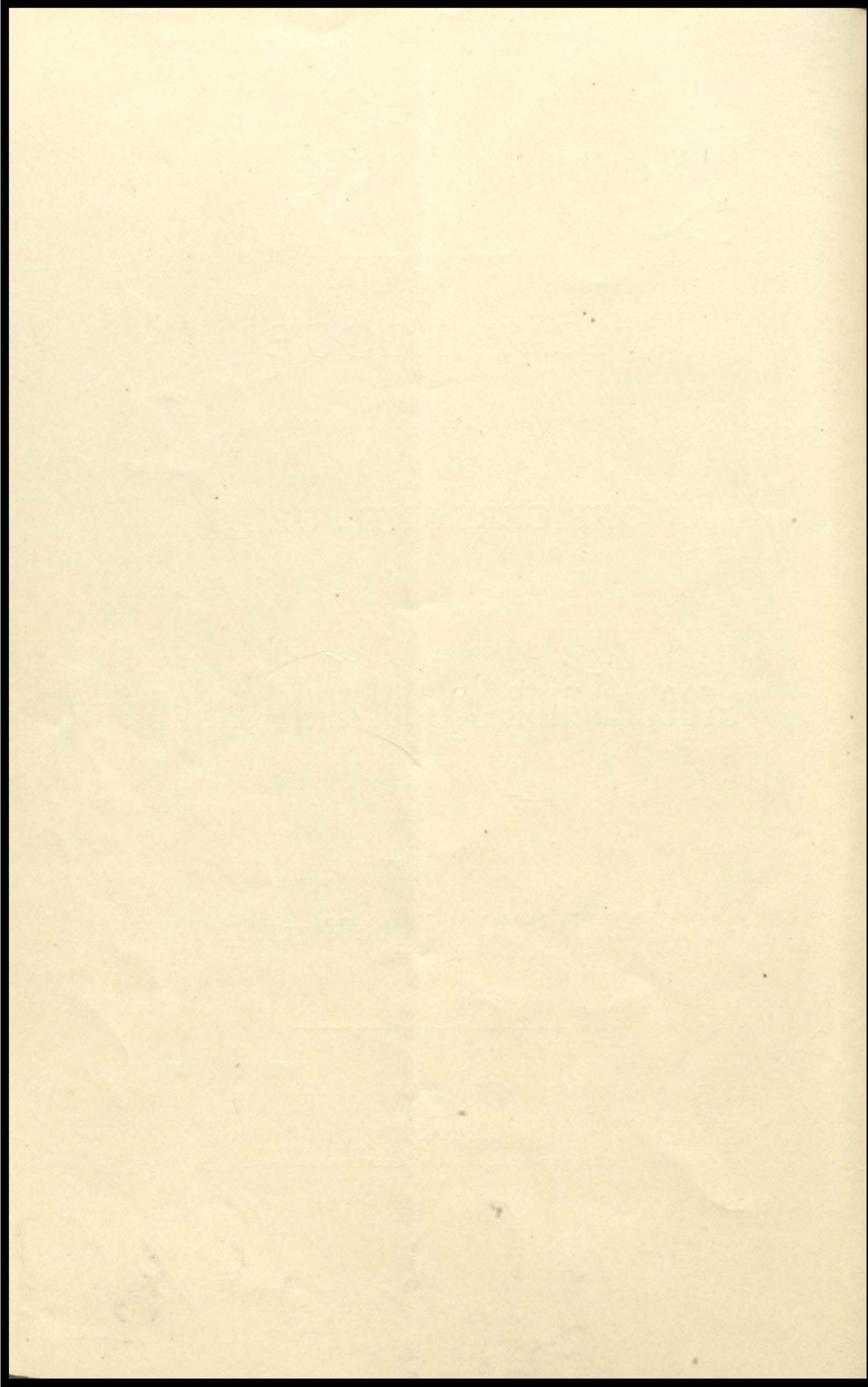

COURSE OF STUDY.

The course of study provides for twelve years' work ; two years in the primary, three in the intermediate, three in the grammar and four in the academic department. The following is a summary of the work required :

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.—*First Grade.*—Reading from charts ; first reader. Spelling with reading exercise and written work. Writing and reading simple numbers. Elementary work in addition and subtraction. Object lessons in color, form, points of compass, etc.

Second Grade.—Second reader. Attention given to formation of language. Spelling. Lessons in numbers as first year, simple multiplication and division added. Object lessons, introducing time, oral geography, etc.

INTERMEDIATE DEPARTMENT.—*Third Grade.*—Third reader begun. Spelling, words from speller and copying. Writing, copy book No. 1 and from blackboard. Lessons in numbers. Primary arithmetic begun. Oral geography ; primary geography begun. Object lessons. Language lessons.

Fourth Grade.—Third reader. Spelling. Primary arithmetic through long division ; mental arithmetic. Primary geography to map of Asia, Language lessons continued. Conversational lessons. Writing, copy book No. 2.

Fifth Grade.—Third reader completed ; fourth reader begun. Spelling. Writing, copy book No. 3. Primary arithmetic ; review and fractions ; mental arithmetic. Primary geography completed. Language lessons continued. Composition and declamation.

GRAMMAR DEPARTMENT.—*Sixth Grade.*—Reading, fourth reader. Spelling, oral and written. Writing, copy books Nos. 2 and 3 reviewed. Drawing. Grammar school geography begun. Grammar, lessons dictated. Complete arithmetic begun.

Seventh Grade.—Fourth reader completed ; historical reading. Spelling. Writing, copy books Nos. 3 and 4. Grammar school geography to map of Europe. Grammar lessons dictated. Practical arithmetic to fractions.

Eighth Grade.—Fifth reader. Spelling. Practical arithmetic to percentage. Writing, copy book No. 4. Drawing. Grammar school geography finished. Grammar text book begun.

Composition, declamation and elementary physiology in each grade.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT.—*Ninth Grade*.—Arithmetic considered as a science ; first term to fractions ; second term, fractions, common and decimal ; third term, compound numbers, longitude and time, elementary principles of percentage. Grammar, review. Geography, review, map drawing and geography of New York state.

The academic work proper begins with the tenth grade and calls for three years' work. This course is similar in many respects to that prescribed by the Regents of the University. The diploma of the Regents is a requisite for graduation from this institution. The following are the studies in each grade for each term of the literary course :

The substitution of German (three terms), civil government, book-keeping, English history, English literature (one term each) may be allowed. In the classical course four additional terms of Latin and six terms of Greek are substituted for studies in the above list.

Compositions and declamations in each grade.

TEXT BOOKS.

COMMON ENGLISH.—Geography, *Swinton*; Spelling, *Gilbert, Sanders*; Arithmetic, *Fish*, (Robinson's Shorter Course); Grammar, *Reed and Kellogg*; Readers, *Barnes*; Writing, *Ellsworth*.

MATHEMATICS.—Algebra, *Milne*; Geometry, *Wentworth*; Trigonometry, *Wentworth*; Book-keeping, *Meservey*.

SCIENCES.—Botany, *Gray*; Geology, *Dana*; Chemistry, *Houston*; Physics, *Cooley*; Physiology, *Steele*; Astronomy, *Steele*; Civil Government, *Young*; Physical Geography, *Monteith*.

LANGUAGES.—German, *Sheldon's Grammar, Whitney's Texts*; Latin, *Allen and Greenough's Grammar, Comstock's First Latin Book*; Greek, *Goodwin's Grammar, White's Lessons*.

HISTORY AND BELLES-LETTRES.—American History, *Barnes*; Grecian History, *Barnes*; English History, *Stone*; Roman History, *Pennell*; Rhetoric, *Hill*; English Literature, *Kellogg*.

TERMS.

Board with rooms can be obtained in private families for from \$3.00 to \$4.00 per week. Rooms for self-boarders can be found at reasonable rates.

The charge for tuition is as follows:

Bills payable in advance. Pupils may enter any time during a term and pay proportionately; but no bills will be made out for less than one-fourth term; and no deductions will be made for absence of less than three weeks.

LOCATION.

Greene is situated on the Chenango river and on the Utica and Binghamton division of the D., L. & W. Railway, twenty miles north of Binghamton.

LIBRARY AND APPARATUS.

The library consists of about 1,100 volumes, comprising standard works of biography, travel, history, literature, science and fiction. Dictionaries, The American Cyclopædia, gazetteers and other reference works are always accessible. Apparatus is on hand for illustrating physics, chemistry, physiology and astronomy. Apparatus and books are being added each year. During the present year the Annual American Cyclopædias from 1876 to 1886 have been purchased.

SCHOOL HOURS.

Pupils are required to be in attendance from 9 to 11:45 o'clock A. M., and from 1:15 to 3:30 o'clock P. M. It is expected that pupils of the higher grades will devote additional time to study.

NORMAL CLASS.

Instruction is given in the theory and practice of teaching in classes organized under the supervision of the Regents of the University. To members of this class tuition is free. Applications for membership should be made to the Principal.

PRIZES.

Prizes are given by the Principal to the members of the tenth grade who excel in grammar. The examination for 1887 was upon the grammatical structure of Bryant's *Thanatopsis*; the awards were made as follows:
