



## COURSE OF STUDY.

The course of study provides for twelve years' work; two years in the primary, three in the intermediate, three in the grammar and four in the academic department. The following is a summary of the work required:

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.—First Grade.—Chart; first reader; second reader begun. Spelling, written and oral. Writing and reading simple numbers; elementary work in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, as far as twenty.

Second Grade.—Second reader finished; third reader begun. Spelling, oral and written. Language lessons, oral and written. Number work in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division as far as one hundred. Oral lessons in geography, history and physiology.

INTERMEDIATE DEPARTMENT.—Third Grade.—Third reader. Spelling, words from book and from dictation. Writing, copy book No. 1 and from blackboard. Primary arithmetic begun. Oral geography; primary geography begun. Object lessons in language.

Fourth Grade.—Third reader finished; supplementary reading. Spelling. Primary arithmetic through long division; mental arithmetic. Primary geography to map of Africa. Language lessons continued; text book begun. Writing, copy book No. 2.

Fifth Grade.—Fourth reader begun; supplementary reading. Spelling. Writing, copy book No. 3. Primary arithmetic; review and fractions; mental arithmetic. Primary geography completed. Language, text book continued.

Map drawing and declamation in each grade.

GRAMMAR DEPARTMENT.—Sixth Grade.—Reading, fourth reader. Spelling, oral and written. Writing, copy books Nos. 3 and 4. Drawing. Grammar school geography begun. Grammar, Reed and Kellogg's Graded Lessons in English begun. Complete arithmetic begun.

Seventh Grade.—Fifth reader begun; historical reading. Spelling. Writing, copy books Nos. 3 and 4. Grammar school geography to map of Europe. Grammar, Graded Lessons in English finished. Practical arithmetic to compound numbers.

Eighth Grade.—Fifth reader. Spelling. Practical arithmetic to percentage. Writing, copy book No. 4. Drawing. Grammar school geography finished. Grammar, text book begun.

Composition, declamation, elementary physiology and supplementary reading in each grade.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT.—Ninth Grade.—Arithmetic considered as a science; first term to fractions; second term, fractions, common and decimal; third term, compound numbers, longitude and time, percentage. Grammar, review. Geography, review, map drawing and geography of New York state.

The academic work proper begins with the tenth grade and calls for three years' work. This course is similar to that prescribed by the Regents of the University. The diploma of the Regents is a requisite for graduation. The following are the studies in each grade for each term of the literary course:

The substitution of German (three terms), book-keeping, political economy, chemistry, English history, English literature (one term each) may be allowed. In the classical course four additional terms of Latin and six terms of Greek are required.

Instruction and practice is given in Type-writing; the instrument used is the Remington Standard, Number 2.

Compositions and declamations in each grade.

## TEXT BOOKS.

Common English.—Geography, Swinton; Spelling, Gilbert; Arithmetic, intermediate grades, Sheldon; grammar grades, Fish; academic grades, Wentworth; Grammar, Reed and Kellogg; Readers, Barnes; Writing, Spencerian.

MATHEMATICS.—Algebra, Milne; Geometry, Wentworth; Trigonometry, Wentworth; Book-keeping, Meservey.

Sciences.—Botany, Gray; Geology, Dana; Chemistry, Steele; Physics, Cooley; Physiology, Steele; Astronomy, Steele; Civil Government, Young; Physical Geography, Monteith.

Languages.—German, Comfort's Grammar, Whitney's Texts; Latin, Allen and Greenough's Grammar; Comstock's First Latin Book; Greek, Goodwin's Grammar; White's Lessons.

HISTORY AND BELLES-LETTRES.—American History, Barnes; Grecian History, Barnes; English History, Montgomery; Roman History, Barnes; Rhetoric, Hill; English Literature, Kellogg.

## TERMS.

Board with rooms can be obtained in private families for from \$3.00 to \$4.00 per week. Rooms for self-boarders can be found at reasonable rates.

The charge for tuition is as follows:

Music, per term of twenty lessons, . .

Bills payable in advance. Pupils may enter any time during a term and pay proportionately; but no bills will be made out for less than one-fourth term; and no deductions will be made for absence of less than three weeks.

## LOCATION.

Greene is situated on the Chenango river and on the Utica and Binghamton division of the D. L. & W. Railway, twenty miles north of Binghamton.

## LIBRARY AND APPARATUS.

The library consists of about 1,100 volumes, comprising standard works of biography, travel, history, literature, science and fiction. Dictionaries, The American Cyclopædia, with the Annuals, gazetteers and other reference works are always accessible. Apparatus is on hand for illustrating physics, chemistry, physiology and astronomy. Apparatus and books are being added each year. During the present year collections of minerals and fossils for illustrating the subject of geology have been placed in the school.

The buildings are warmed by combined steam and furnace heat, are thoroughly ventilated, and furnished with modern appliances.

## SCHOOL HOURS.

Pupils are required to be in attendance from 9 to 11:45 o'clock A. M., and from 1:15 to 3:30 o'clock P. M. It is expected that pupils of the higher grades will devote additional time to study. Pupils of the first and second grades may be dismissed at 11 o'clock and at 3 o'clock.

## NORMAL CLASS.

Instruction is given in the theory and practice of teaching in classes organized under the supervision of the Regents of the University. To members of this class tuition is free. Applications for membership should be made to the Principal.

## PRIZES.

Prizes are given by the Principal to the members of the tenth grade who excel in grammar. The examination for 1888 was upon the grammatical structure of Gray's Elegy in a Country Churchyard.

Two equal prizes were awarded to ERMA WALKER.
