



Course of Study.

The course of study provides for twelve years' work, two years in each of the lower departments, and four years in the academic department. The following is a summary of the work required:

FIRST PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.—First Grade.—Chart; first reader; second reader begun. Spelling, written and oral. Writing and reading simple numbers; elementary work in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, as far as thirty. Drawing.

Second Grade.—Second reader finished. Spelling, oral and written. Number work in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division as far as seventy-five. Language. Oral lessons in geography, history and physiology. Drawing.

Second Primary Department.—Third Grade.—Third reader begun. Supplementary reading. Spelling, oral and written. Tables completed and reviewed. Primary arithmetic during the Spring term. Oral lessons in geography, history and physiology. Drawing.

Fourth Grade.—Third reader completed, fourth reader begun; supplementary reading. Written spelling. Primary arithmetic to fractions. Oral geography; primary geography begun. Language and composition lessons from text-book. Drawing.

Intermediate Department.—Fifth Grade.—Fourth reader; supplementary reading. Written spelling; word studies. Complete primary arithmetic. Introductory grammar. Finish primary geography and map drawing. Writing. Drawing.

Sixth Grade.—Fourth reader. Spelling. Writing, copy books. Drawing. Geography to Canada. Introductory grammar. Complete arithmetic to fractions. Elementary physiology.

GRAMMAR DEPARTMENT.—Seventh Grade.—Reading from fifth reader and history. Spelling. Writing. Geography to Africa. Introductory grammar reviewed and advanced grammar begun. Drawing. Complete arithmetic to measurements.

Eighth Grade.—Reading. Spelling. Complete arithmetic to discount. Writing. Drawing. Geography finished. Elementary English finished. Intellectual arithmetic.

Composition work, declamations, recitations and supplementary reading in each grade. Drawing includes clay modeling, and stick and tablet laying; the work for the different grades is the same as laid out in Prang's Manual.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT—The studies of the Academic Department are arranged according to the courses of study which the different pupils are pursuing, and lead to a Regent's diploma which is required for graduation. The form given below contains the course of studies to be pursued, which may be varied by substituting one or more elective subjects chosen from the Regent's course. Two grades often take one or more studies together, thus securing fewer but larger classes, and increasing the interest in the study.

The studies in the grades above the ninth are changed somewhat from year to year, being adapted to the studies offered at the different examinations of the Regents, and arranged to meet the needs of the pupils. Some studies, however, are best taken during the work of particular grades, as rhetoric and algebra in the tenth, geometry and Latin in the eleventh, and Cæsar in the twelfth.

Science.—Botany. Gray; Geology, Dana; Chemistry, Avery; Physics, Avery; Physiology, Steele; Astronomy, Steele; Civil Government, Young; Economics, Chapin; Physical Geography, Houston: Health Lessons, Pathfinder.

Languages.—German, Joynes-Meissner Grammar, Worman's First and Second Books; Latin, Allen and Greenough's Grammar, Jones' First Lessons, Harper and Tolman's Cæsar, Allen and Greenough's Cicero, Harper's Virgil; Greek, Goodwin's Grammar, White's Lessons.

HISTORY AND BELLES-LETTERS.—History of New York State, Hendrick; American History, Barnes; Grecian History, Barnes; English History, Montgomery; Roman History, Barnes; Lessons in English, Lockwood; Rhetoric, D. J. Hill; English Literature, Shaw; American Literature, Hawthorne.

Bills payable quarterly in advance. Pupils may enter at any time and pay proportionately; but no bills will be made out for less than four weeks, and no deduction will be made for absence of less than three weeks per quarter.

LOCATION.

Greene is situated on the Chenango River, and on the Utica and Binghamton division of the D., L. & W. Railway, twenty miles north of Binghamton.

Library and Apparatus.

The library consists of about 1,200 volumes, comprising standard works of biography, travel, history, literature, science, and fiction. Dictionaries, the American Cyclopædia, with the Annuals, gazeteers and other reference works are always accessible. Apparatus is on hand for illustrating physics, chemistry, physiology and astronomy. Apparatus and books are being added each year.

The buildings are warmed by combined steam and furnace heat, and furnished with modern appliances.

School Hours.

Pupils are required to be in attendance from 9 to 11:45 o'clock A. M., and from 1:15 to 3:30 o'clock P. M. It is expected that pupils of the higher grades will devote additional time to study. Pupils of the first grade may be dismissed at 11 o'clock and at 3 o'clock.
