Course of Study.

First Primary Department.

First Grade *B* Division.

READING—Object lessons, Blackboard exercises, Elementary phonics, First book of the Literature Series commenced.

SPELLING—Oral and written words from the reader.

NUMBER—Counting from one to fifty, Combining numbers from one to twenty by addition and subtraction.

HYGIENE—Short talks on cleanliness.

DRAWING—Free hand drawing from simple objects and plants, clay modeling and form study, elementary color.

WRITING—First Book.

MUSIC—Rote Songs.

MEMORIZING—Short poems.

First Grade *A* Division.

READING—First Book of the Literature Series completed, Supplementary Reading, Riverside Primer and Reader, Bow-wow and Mew-mew Series.

SPELLING—Phonics, Written and oral words in daily use.

NUMBER—Writing and reading numbers from one to two hundred. Roman numerals from one to ten. Addition. Days of the week, time by

clock, gills, pints, quarts, dime, inches, foot.

PHYSIOLOGY—Elementary work in Hygiene.

DRAWING—Clay modeling, Color work, Free hand drawing of plants and fruits.

MUSIC—Rote songs.

WRITING—Maynard and Merrill's Modern Penmanship.

Second Grade.

READING—Second Book of the Literature Series completed, Supplementary reading, Cyr's Second Reader, Paul's Trip with the Moon, Danish Fairy Tales.

SPELLING—Phonics, Written and oral words from Reader. Words of daily life.

NUMBER—Writing and reading numbers from 200 to 1,000. Roman numerals from 10 to 1,000. Addition and Subtraction. Denominate numbers, time, money, quarts, pounds, yard, square inch.

LANGUAGE—Elementary sentence work. Capitals, period, question mark. Oral and written stories.

PHYSIOLOGY—Elementary work in Hygiene and Anatomy.

DRAWING—Clay modeling, Color work, Paper folding and cutting, Free-hand drawing of simple objects, plants and fruits.

MUSIC—Rote Songs.

WRITING—Maynard and Merrill's Modern Penmanship.

GEOGRAPHY—Direction, Observation lessons

on slope, hill, river, work of water, making of soil. Reading from Seven Little Sisters.

GENERAL LESSON—Objects: To teach the child to observe intelligently, and to use his five senses; to help him to see the use and beauty of the common things about him; to broaden his horizon by stories of other places and people; to interest him in Nature; to inculcate patriotism; to teach politeness; care for the old, the weak and the unfortunate, and respects for the rights of other. The topic is generally determined by the season, flowers, fruit, trees, seeds, ice, snow, birds simple insects, domestic animals, the Pilgrims, Washington, Lincoln, etc.

Fourth Grade.

READING—Literature Fourth Reader, Supplementary Reading; Uncle Robert's Geography, Seaside and Wayside No. 2, Wonderbook, McGuffey's Reader No. 4, American Life and Adventure, Phonics.

SPELLING—Harrington's Spelling Book, Part II to Lesson 67.

ARITHMETIC—Milne's First Book, to Fractions, with supplementary work.

LANGUAGE—Hyde's First Book, Part II, with supplementary work, in memorizing, punctuation and composition.

GEOGRAPHY—Harper's Elementary to South America.

DRAWING—Same as Third Grade.

PHYSIOLOGY—Child's Health Primer.

NATURE STUDY—Same as Third Grade, and Study of Animals.

WRITING—Merrill's Modern Penmanship.

MUSIC—Rote songs, long and short sounds, half, whole, quarter and eighth notes; two, three and four part measure, half, whole and quarter rests; marking time; sharps, one, two, three and four; flat, one; reading and writing of music.

Second Primary Department.

Third Grade.

READING—Literature Third Reader, Supplementary Reading, Harper's Third Reader, Tables and Folk Stories, Danish Fairy Tales, American Life and Adventure, Stories of Great Americans, Phonics.

SPELLING—Harrington's Spelling Book, Part I.

ARITHMETIC—Tables reviewed, Milne's Arithmetic by grades, with supplementary work in rotation, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

LANGUAGE—Hyde's First Book, Part I, with supplementary work, in memorizing, punctuation and composition.

GEOGRAPHY—Oral work and Harper's Elementary, to Southern States.

DRAWING—Form study, picture study, free hand drawing, mechanical drawing, lines, angles, etc, geometric figures, illustrative sketching, botanical drawing and color work.

PHYSIOLOGY—Child's Health Primer.

WRITING—Merrill's Modern Penmanship.

NATURE STUDY—Study of seeds and our common birds.

MUSIC—Same as Fourth Grade.

Intermediate Department.

Fifth Grade.

READING—Graded Literature Series, Book V, Supplementary work in Geographical Studies of North America, Sea-side and Way-side Nature Readers, Stories of American Life and Adventure, Little Lame Prince, Phonics and diacritical markings taught.

SPELLING—Begin Part II in text-book, combine oral and written work.

WRITING—Barnes' Vertical, No. 5.

ARITHMETIC—Review work of previous year, take up and complete fractions. Atwood's Arithmetic for supplementary work. Mental drill.

LANGUAGE—Begin Reed & Kellogg's Elementary. Letter Writing and bills. Hyde's and Maxwell's for supplementary work.

PHYSIOLOGY—Pathfinder No. 2 complete.

GEOGRAPHY—Elementary begun and completed.

DRAWING—Review previous work and teach complementary colors. Study cylinder, cone, square, pyramid and objects based upon these. Perspective begun, also problem work. Borders

and simple decorative designs. Much free-hand work.

Sixth Grade.

READING—Graded Literature Series, Book VI, Supplementary Reading, Geographical Studies of Asia, King of the Golden River, Evangeline, Phonics and dictionary work.

SPELLING—Text book, oral and written work.

WRITING—Barnes' Vertical, No. 6.

ARITHMETIC—Begin Milne's Standard, through decimals, much supplementary work, and mental drill.

GRAMMAR—Complete Elementary book; Review Letter writing, bills, notices, etc. Maxwell's for supplementary work.

PHYSIOLOGY—Pathfinder, No. 2, complete.

GEOGRAPHY—Begin Advanced book. Motions of the earth and their effects, latitude and longitude, climate and its modifications. Review natural divisions, North America, South America, and Europe, with political divisions of same, Maps to illustrate contour and relief of same.

DRAWING—Same as fifth grade.

Grammar Department.

Seventh Year.

READING—Reading from Civic and Historical readers such as "The Young American" by Judson, "The Story of the Romans" by Guerber.

SPELLING—Spelling and word formation. Text book, Gilbert.

WRITING—Vertical system.

GEOGRAPHY—Text book, Redway and Hinman. Review Europe, study Asia, maps of contour, productions etc. Second term study, U. S. Standard time, Africa, Australasia and New York state.

GRAMMAR—Advanced grammar begun, Text book, Reed and Kellogg.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE—Text book, Steele, with other books for reference.

ARITHMETIC—Text book, Milne. Fractions reviewed, advanced to percentage.

DRAWING—As outlined in the Regent's Syllabus.

MUSIC—Same as Eighth grade.

Eighth Grade.

SPELLING—Word analysis etc. Text book, Gilbert.

WRITING—Vertical System.

GEOGRAPHY—Text book, Redway and Hinman. Reviewed for Regent's.

GRAMMAR—Reading and practice work from such books as prescribed by the Regents' for Elementary English, Text book, Reed and Kellogg's Higher Lessons in English.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE—Text book, Steele, finished and reviewed.

ARITHMETIC—Completed and general review of whole subject. Text book, Milne.

DRAWING—As outlined in the Regents' Syllabus for elementary examination in drawing.

MUSIC—Technical time, scales in flats and sharps, musical vocabulary, sight reading, two part singing.

HISTORY—Elementary U. S. History. Text book, Montgomery.

NATURE STUDY—General lessons preparatory to High School science.

High School Department.

The basis of admission to the High School is a Regents' Preliminary Certificate.

Three courses are offered, the completion of any one of which entitles the student to a Regents' diploma, also a diploma from the High School.

The courses are in part elective, yet it is expected that every student will take three studies each day.

All students are required to do regular work in declamation and recitation.

The work is so arranged that four years in the High school will give a complete preparation for college. The standard of the school is such that its diploma will enter students in many colleges without further examination.

General.

The school buildings are open at an early hour to accommodate those coming from a distance, also those desiring the rooms for study.

Pupils are expected to remain in their respective rooms during school hours and give their time not devoted to recitation to the preparation of lessons.

The morning session begins at 9 o'clock and closes at 11:45. The afternoon session begins at 1:15 and closes at 3:30. The first grade may be dismissed at 11 o'clock and 3 o'clock.

It is of the greatest importance that pupils be regular and punctual in attendance. Parents can do much towards bringing this about. Attention is called to the provisions of the Compulsory School Law on another page. In connection with this, at the recommendation of the State Superintendent, the Board of Education has adopted the following: Sickness of the child, sickness in the family requiring the services of the child, or some extreme necessity whereby the child is detained, shall be the only excuses for absence from school. Also upon returning to school a written excuse shall be presented to the teacher, signed by the parent or guardian and stating the time of the absence and reason for the same.

Board or suitable accommodations for those who wish to board themselves can be obtained

at low rates. The Principal will give his personal assistance in helping any who desire to find good boarding places. Greatly reduced rates may be obtained by those going and returning by the Lackawanna railroad.

The equipment for illustrating the natural and physical sciences is good, and is being improved each year.

The library contains 1600 volumes which includes a carefully selected list of reference books, always accessible to the student, besides many books of standard and modern fiction.

Parents are cordially invited to visit the school and learn more directly concerning the work of their children. The teachers will be glad to talk with you about it. In this way you may arouse your child to greater interest in his studies.

Formal examinations occur regularly once in ten weeks; written tests may be given at any time, however, at the option of the teacher.

Regular promotions take place once a year. If, however, a pupil shows evidence of being in advance of his grade, and also shows a capacity for doing more work, he may be placed in the next higher grade at any time during the year.



Compulsory Education Law.

Required attendance upon instruction, as amended by section 1, chapter 606, Laws of 1896, as follows:

a All children between 8 and 12 years of age, in proper mental and physical condition, must attend at least 80 consecutive days, also when not legally employed.

b All children between 14 and 16 years must attend at least 80 consecutive days, also when not legally employed.

c All children between 14 and 16 years must attend when not legally employed.

The law provides penalties for those in parental relation to children, who neglect or refuse to cause children to attend upon instruction as required by law.

Contracting Districts.

By a law passed in 1897, any school district, at its annual meeting, may empower its trustee to contract with a Union School for the instruction of the pupils of the district, and may also vote funds for the transportation of the pupils to and from the Union School.

A district so contracting does not lose its public money but draws \$100 as before.

It would be to the material advantage of many nearby districts to make such a contract with the Board of Education of the Greene High School.

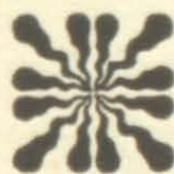
