Somehow we have made it; this time we have won.

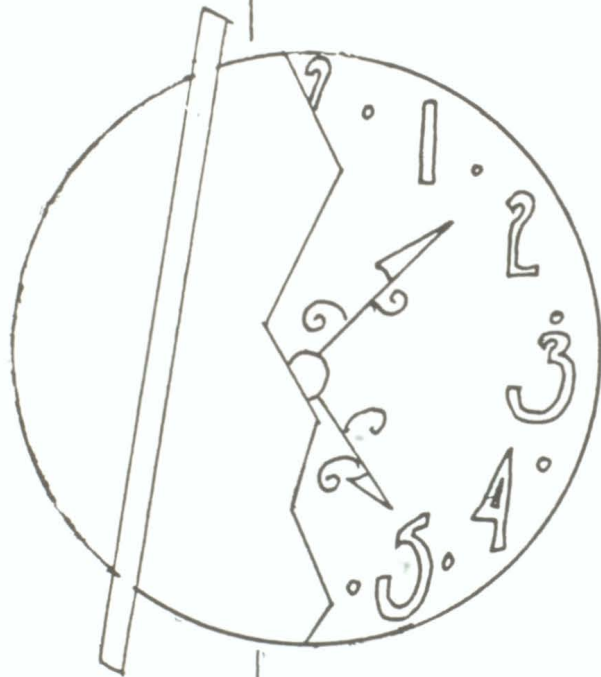

Never letting anything get in our way.

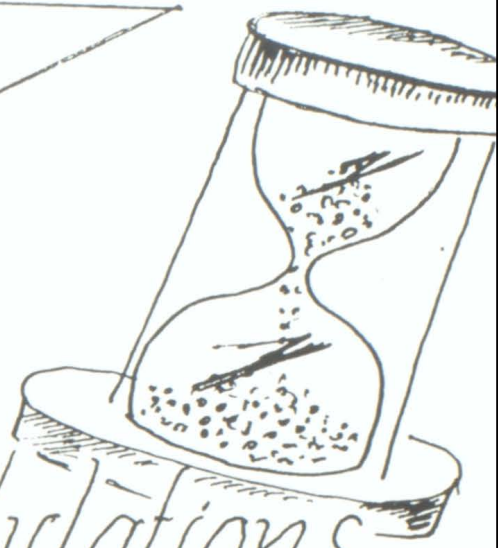

Sixty students from ten different school districts attend the Alternative High School for Broome-Chenango counties this year. The four Alternative School students from Greene go to the Harpursville School District, nineteen miles away. This school offers an alternative educational program to traditional schools. The environment is less restricted and the classes are smaller. Guidance is an important part of the education, and the staff provides instruction at the independent level of each student. When students learn their skills and subject matter, they are given more difficult work. In this way, students grow academically. The Alternative School Program is in concept the same as any other high school, and offers the same subjects and education. However, more than half of the students have some kind of work related experience. Students who participate in the Alternative School Program are still part of their home school and can take part in sports, dances, and other activities there.

The Greene Varsity Soccer team finished a fantastic year with a heartbreaking loss to Cooperstown at Mohawk Valley Community College on November 9. Playing in the State quarterfinals, these two teams played four overtime periods to a tie with the Trojans in a shoot-out.

The Trojans finished the regular season on October 18, with a 10-0 win over Unatego to finish with a league record of 8-1-1. In Section IV competition, Greene defeated Newark Valley and Oneonta to advance to the finals at Vestal High School on Friday, November 1. In an exciting game under the lights, the Trojans defeated Whitney Point 2-1 with goals being scored by Frank Cannarella and Brian Morehouse. The defense, led by goalkeeper Tim Calice and fullbacks Earl Lancaster, Robert Root, Brian Niles, and Phil Bordwell, held off a late Whitney Point charge. A huge crowd cheered the biggest win in Greene soccer history as the team and coach received their Sectional Championship medals and trophy.

The Trojans finished with an overall record of 16-2-4. The New York State Soccer poll rated Greene seventh in their end-of-season rankings for small schools . . . a tremendous accomplishment! The Susquenango Association awarded first team all-star honors to Ron Rapp, Jeff Sergi, Phil Bordwell and Frank Cannarella. Second team all-star honors were awarded to Brian Morehouse and Tim Russell. Another noteworthy achievement was given to the Tim Calice as The Press and Sun-Bulletin Athlete of the Week the first week of November.

All in all, we are proud of the accomplishments of these boys and of the standards they have set for future soccer teams here in Greene.

This year, Miss Bouley's French IV class taught basic French skills to elementary students. Five kindergarten classes and one first grade class had been taught. Mrs. Ross' Spanish IV class also taught to younger students. However, they taught older pupils — fifth and sixth graders. They will also be doing a Spanish cooking unit and will be reading Don Quixote.

This year, the Creative Writing/Journalism class, along with Mr. Cline, decided to bring back an old tradition. A new Newspaper Club began. The first issue of Trojan Integrity came out on December 19, 1991. It contained an editorial, a story, a few poems, sports news, and artwork. This first issue was free to the student body. The second issue was even better because instead of just printing it on a regular printer, a laser printer was used. It made the newspaper look more professional.
